G6 GTE Term 3 Revision: Important concepts and Blooquet!

The main concepts from each unit:

1. What is onomatopoeia?

- Onomatopoeia are sound words like 'bang,' 'clatter,' 'ribbit,' or 'splash.'
 - Usually writers use standard onomatopoeias that can be found in the dictionary but sometimes writers make up new ones as well.
 - Onomatopoeic words can be used as nouns, verbs or adjectives.

2. What is realistic fiction?

- Realistic fiction is made-up stories where the all the characters, the setting and plot events could happen in the real world.
- Reading realistic fiction helps us see other people face similar problems as we do, and we can be inspired by the way they resolved their struggles.
- Realistic fiction helps us feel less alone as we face our own struggles.
- Realistic fiction usually takes place in the present or recent past.

3. What are inferences?

- **Inferences** are good guesses about something based upon clues and our own background knowledge. (*So, they aren't random guesses! They are 'educated guesses.'*)
- Readers must make inferences about characters' thoughts and feeling because the writer used 'show don't tell' (the writer didn't tell us what the characters are thinking or feeling)
- You can be 99% sure an inference is correct but NOT 100%. If you are 100% sure of something - it's not an inference, it's just a fact.

4. What are fantasy stories?

- A fantasy is a make-believe story that has characters, settings or plot events that could not happen in the real world.
- Fantasies may still have some realistic elements, but they also have make-believe elements.

5. Descriptive Language.

- Roald Dahl uses many kinds of descriptive language in the Chocolate Room scene of *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*.
- These descriptive writing tools are called literary devices. They include tools such as use of **adjectives, adverbs, descriptive nouns & verbs, sensory details, simile, metaphor, dialogue, personification, hyperbole**, and more.
